Ultrasound 20 Week Scan

What is a 20-week screening scan?

A 20 week screening scan looks for 11 different conditions in your baby, but it cannot find everything that may be wrong. The scan will look in detail at your baby's bones, heart, brain, spine, face, kidneys and abdomen.

In most cases, the scan will show that your baby appears to be developing as expected but sometimes a condition may be found, or suspected. Some things can be seen more clearly than others. For example, some babies may have a condition called Open Spina Bifida, which affects the spinal cord.

Spina bifida can usually be seen clearly on a scan and of those babies who have this condition, around 9 out of 10 (90%) will be detected. Some other conditions, such as heart defects, are more difficult to see. The scan will find about half (50%) of those babies who have heart defects.

Some of the conditions that can be seen on the scan will mean the baby may need treatment or surgery after it is born, for example cleft lip.

In a small number of cases some very serious conditions are found. For example, the baby's brain, kidneys, internal organs or bones may not have developed properly.

We encourage you to read this before you attend for the scan.

Preparation for the scan

Please attend this examination with a full bladder ie. one pint of clear liquid one hour prior to the scan. This raises your baby from a position behind your pelvic bones. An empty bladder may result in unnecessary waiting time of up to one hour.

What happens when you arrive?

Please check in at the ultrasound reception desk in the Sharoe Green Unit and take a seat in reception.

Your scan will be performed by an experienced, qualified sonographer, or a sonographer under supervision whilst training. If you find the presence of a student at your scan to be a problem, please inform a member of staff.

Can you bring a relative or friend with you?

Due to lack of space and to respect your privacy, we can only permit one adult to attend the ultrasound examination. The sonographer needs to concentrate on the screen and will demonstrate the scan at the end of the examination and answer any queries you or your partner may have at this time.

Please note that we do not have childcare facilities so we ask that you do not bring small children with you unless accompanied. We do not allow children into the scan rooms.

What happens during the procedure?

The scan will be performed in an ultrasound room. You will be asked to lie on a couch and gel will be applied to your abdomen. An ultrasound probe will be used to get the images of the baby.

Your baby is fully formed at this stage and moves freely in the fluid that surrounds it. The scan will:

- Check the baby's anatomy and general well-being
- Check the position of the afterbirth, this sometimes needs a follow up scan later in your pregnancy

The scan will take approximately 30 minutes, although this may vary depending on the position of your baby.

If the position of your baby causes difficulties in assessing the anatomy, a further appointment will be made for you to re-attend the department.

Can I have a scan image of my baby?

Ultrasound images of your baby are available at a cost of £5 each; payment is by the correct cash or card via a ticket machine. Please do not purchase your tickets until after your scan as images are not always possible and refunds cannot be given. Please let the sonographer know how many images you would like during your scan as images cannot be printed once the scan is complete. If you choose to have an image printed, please note that:

- Images are not likely to last for longer than 5 years
- Obtaining an image can be time consuming and often difficult due to the baby's position and therefore parents may find it difficult to interpret the image
- The image will be destroyed if covered by a clear laminate
- The images are for personal use only and not for diagnostic purposes

PLEASE NOTE: We do not allow patients or visitors to video or photograph during the Ultrasound scans. All mobile devices must be switched off whilst in the scan room.

After the procedure

In most cases you will be able to go straight home after the scan. The sonographer will refer you to a midwife if additional input is required.

Are there any side effects?

There are not usually any side effects experienced following a scan.

Are there any risks?

There are no known risks in the limited use of ultrasound scans in pregnancy.

Your results

Once the scan is completed the sonographer will share the results with you.
