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My Clinical Nurse Specialist/Key Worker is:

Neuro-Oncology Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNS)

Our team consists of nurses with specialist expertise in the field of brain and central nervous system tumours. You may sometimes hear your clinical specialist nurse referred to as your Key Worker.

A Key Worker is someone who coordinates between the various people that may be involved in your care both in the hospital and when you are at home.

You will meet a member of the CNS team either at a clinic appointment or on the wards. You may have contact with any member of the team throughout your treatment and follow up at Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust.

We form part of a multidisciplinary team who provide care during your admission, at diagnosis, during treatment and follow-up care. The team consists of a Neurosurgeon, Neuro-Oncologist, Doctors, Nurses, Occupational Therapist, Physiotherapists, Radiotherapists as well as other health care professionals.

The CNS role involves:

- Meeting you and your family/carers both pre- and post-surgery, giving you the opportunity to ask any questions or discuss any information that has been given to you by your Neurosurgeon or Oncologist.
- Providing a telephone service which is accessible to all patients to discuss any problems that you
 may be experiencing.
- Providing you with written information and contact details.
- Providing nursing advice regarding any symptoms you may experience post-surgery or during treatment.
- The CNS is a main point of contact for you during and after your treatment, for information, advice and support (However, this is NOT an emergency service; please dial 999 if you need urgent medical attention).
- Offer a Health Needs Assessment (HNA) and emotional support. A HNA is a discussion with your CNS to talk about how you are feeling and what is most important to you. Together, we will then create a personalised care plan which focuses on how to manage your concerns and provide contact details. We will signpost you to helpful organisations or services that can offer support.

The information gathered from a HNA can also be shared with the multidisciplinary team (MDT) and your GP to improve your management and care.

 Advanced Care Planning conversations about what is important to you and how you wish to be cared for as your illness progresses. It enables those looking after you to know what matters to you and ensure that your wishes are followed should you become unable to make decisions for yourself.

The CNS team link with other health care professionals who they can refer you to for additional help and support if required:

- Benefits advice and social service referrals
- Epilepsy Specialist Nurse
- Occupational Therapist, Physiotherapist and Speech and Language Therapists
- Counselling services/Psychologist
- Complementary Therapist
- Other community teams regarding your care such as GP, therapists, District Nurse and Palliative Care services
